In text Citations

(using parenthesis, in APA style)

You must give credit to where you found research that you use for your term papers, by "citing" the materials you use. If your paper includes your own experiences and opinions, they do not have to be cited. But all facts, statistics and ideas that are not your own must be referenced. For research papers, that will be most of what you write, except facts that are common knowledge. There will be a References list at the end of the paper, but you must put In-text citations in the body of the paper. These go in parentheses after all exact quotes, and after all paragraphs or sections of your paper where you need to give credit to the source of that information, even when it is written in your own words. In APA style you list the author (or short title if there is no author) & the date published in body of the paper, which points to the full reference on the last page.

Example: (Note that a page number is added for the direct quote)
